AIMS AND FUNCTIONS OF THE SOCIETY

The H. G. Wells Society was founded in 1960, and has members in over twenty countries. It aims to promote widespread interest in the life, work and thought of Herbert George Wells. It organises a number of meetings and events each year, including an annual conference every September.

PUBLICATIONS

The Society publishes a journal and two newsletters each year. It also has available a *Comprehensive Bibliography* of Wells's work (4th revision, 1986). A collected edition of Wells's last two books, *The Happy Turning and Mind at the End of its Tether*, edited by G. P. Wells, is available as a paperback (1982). *The Discovery of the Future, with The Common-Sense of World Peace and The Human Adventure*, edited by Patrick Parrinder, appeared in 1989. *Select Conversations with an Uncle (Now Extinct) with Two Hitherto Unreprinted Conversations*, edited by David C. Smith and Patrick Parrinder, with a foreword by Michael Foot, was published in 1992. *Human Rights and World Order* by James Dilloway, revised and enlarged in 1998 to mark the 50th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, is also available. Most recently the Society has reissued *The Betterave Papers*, Wells's last published series of articles from 1945 (2001), while a history of the Society by John Hammond has also been published (2000).
