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Aims and Functions of the Society

The H. G. Wells Society was founded in 1960, and has members in over twenty countries. It aims to promote widespread interest in the life, work and thought of Herbert George Wells. It organises a number of meetings and events each year, including an annual conference every September.

Publications

The Society publishes a journal and three newsletters each year. A fourth revised and enlarged edition of its *Comprehensive Bibliography* of Wells's work was issued in 1986. A collected edition of Wells's last two books, *The Happy Turning and Mind at the End of its Tether*, edited by G. P. Wells, was published in 1968 and reissued as a paperback in 1982. *The Discovery of the Future, with The Common-Sense of World Peace and The Human Adventure*, edited by Patrick Parrinder, appeared in 1989. *Select Conversations with an Uncle (Now Extinct) with Two Hitherto Unreprinted Conversations*, edited by David C. Smith and Patrick Parrinder, with a foreword by Michael Foot, was published in 1992. *Human Rights and World Order* by James Dilloway, originally published in 1983 and revised and enlarged in 1998 to mark the 50th anniversary of the United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights, is also available. Most recently the Society has reissued *The Betterave Papers*, Wells's last published series of articles from 1945. All Society publications, including back numbers of *The Wellsian* and the *H. G.
